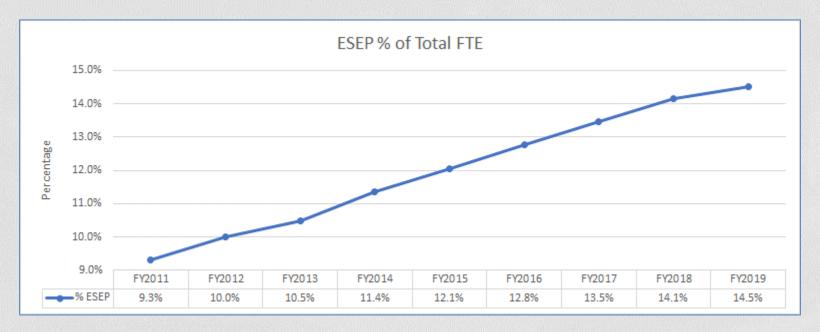

<u>Enrollment Growth</u>. In the 8 years preceding the collapse of the housing market, the district experienced tremendous enrollment growth, increasing over 80% from fiscal years 2000 to 2007. From 2008 to 2011 enrollment growth declined by two-thirds. By 2012, enrollment was declining, compared to modest increases statewide. From 2013 to 2019 enrollment grew 1,600 or 5.7%. 2019 enrollment grew 1.7%, the largest growth rate in a decade and much more than the large district average of 0.2%. 2020 is projected to grow 429 or 1.4%.



ESEP Enrollment Growth. Enrollment in Exceptional Students Educational Programs (ESEP) have increased dramatically over the past several years. In FY2018, the average additional cost per ESEP student was \$2,134 or \$8.9 million total.

- 65% increase over the past 8 years verses -1% in non-ESEP
- 14% greater cost (local and state sources)
- Approximately \$327 per pupil or \$1.4 million is funded locally
- 22% greater cost (local, state and federal sources)

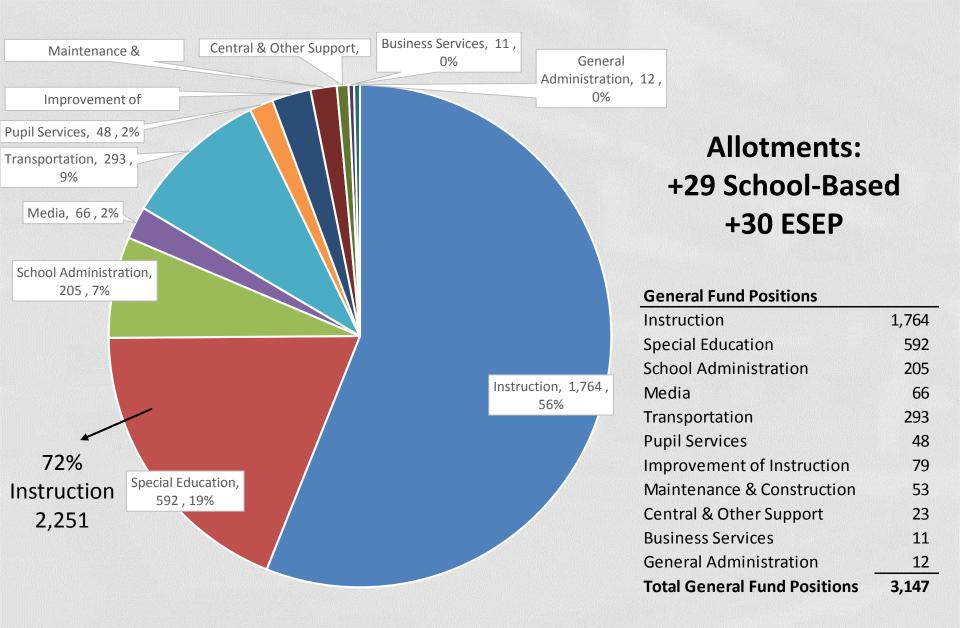

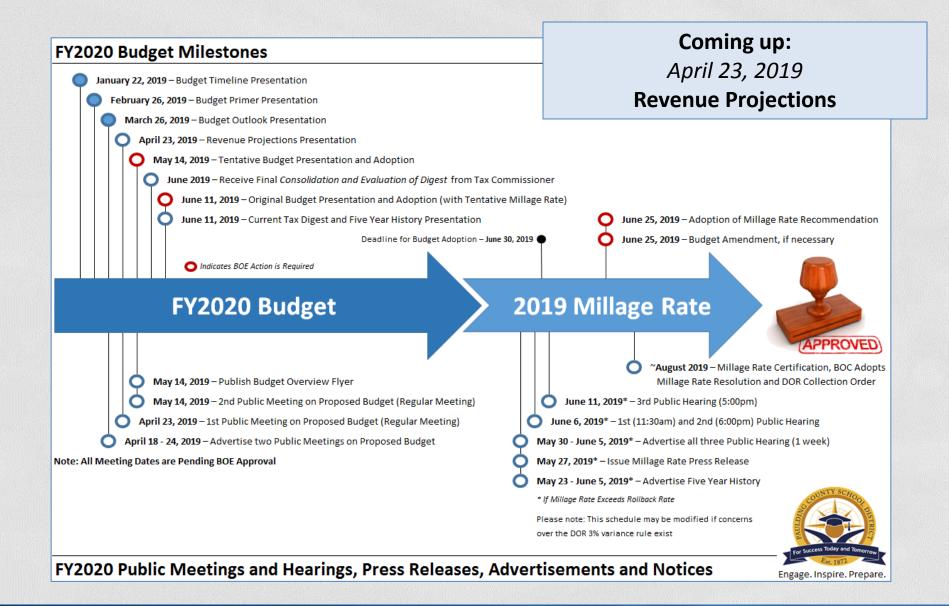
TRS Employer Contribution Rates

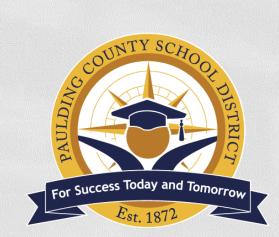


TRS Contribution. Since FY2012, the Teacher Retirement System (TRS) contribution rate has increased 106%. The TRS budget for FY2019 is \$32.6 million or approximately 12% of the total General Fund budget. These expenditures are funded with state and local resources.
