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Introduction

Dear Paulding County School Board and Community Stakeholders,

We are pleased to present the School Leadership Quarterly Report, which provides an update on the progress and key performance indicators of the School Leadership Division. This division oversees **School Operations**, **Safety/Security**, **Student Support Services**, **School Support Services**, and **Transportation**, ensuring the seamless functioning of our schools.

The five departments highlighted in this report address critical areas such as student discipline, parental concerns, building management, Board Policy interpretation, school choice, and principal support. They work collaboratively to remove barriers to student success by offering wrap-around services such as counseling, social work, therapy, and intervention coordination.

In addition to these supports, our non-instructional services include:

- Health and wellness services through school nurses.
- **Student enrollment** and management through Central Registration.
- **Nutrition services** providing high-quality, affordable meals.
- Facility maintenance and custodial care to ensure clean and safe schools.
- Attendance monitoring to improve student engagement.
- Safety and security measures managed by Safety Officers, Coordinators, Advisors, Security Guards, and School Resource Officers through a partnership with the Paulding County Sheriff's Office.

Furthermore, our Transportation Department operates 290 buses daily, covering approximately 23,000 miles to ensure safe and reliable travel for our students.

We remain dedicated to aligning daily school operations with our mission to engage, inspire, and prepare all students for success through thoughtful planning, strategic implementation, and collaborative leadership.



The School Leadership Department upholds the district's mission to **Engage, Inspire, and Prepare** by providing leadership and support to administrators, staff, students, parents, and the community. Our goal is to maximize student achievement, ensure school safety, and enhance services, processes, and communication. With a strong focus on quality customer service, our team is dedicated to exceeding expectations.

The School Leadership Division comprises five key departments: **Safety and Security, School Supports, Student Supports, Transportation, and School Operations**. Together, these departments support the daily operations of all schools and the leaders on our 34 campuses.




School Operations

The School Operations Department supports principals in managing day-to-day operations across the district, with a key focus on monitoring and addressing student discipline. This includes tracking discipline events by school, level, district, student involvement percentages, and incident types. Executive directors and directors use this data to collaborate with school leaders, addressing concerns to maximize instructional time and ensure smooth school operations. In partnership with other district divisions, School Operations leaders also assist in evaluating and supporting principals in all areas of school leadership.

Discipline Data by Level


Discipline data is collected monthly, analyzed for trends, and compared to previous periods. By
































The charts below illustrate the most frequent student discipline events resulting in disciplinary consequences at each level (elementary, middle, and high).



Through these efforts, we continually evolve to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing operational environment, ensuring the safety and well-being of every student and staff member.

Mandatory Reports

Mandatory Reports are all reports required under OCGA 19-7-5. In addition to the reports required by law, threats are also submitted through this system to streamline the process with our law enforcement and judicial partners. All reports are submitted daily so they can be assigned and investigated in a timely manner. A summary of these reports from the 2024-2025 school year to date is shown below.





Crisis Intervention Alerts

The implementation of the Centegix CrisisAlert system has empowered every staff member in the Paulding County School District with immediate access to assistance during critical events across all district properties. This versatile tool is utilized daily for a variety of situations, including medical emergencies, physical altercations, suspicious activity, and more.

In critical incidents such as lockdowns, severe weather, hazardous materials, or other campus-wide emergencies, the system's auditory and visual components enable rapid campus-wide and emergency response notifications.

The charts below illustrate the system's usage during the 2023-2024 school year and the current 2024-2025 school year to date, showcasing its essential role in maintaining safe and secure school environments.





Student Supports

The Student Supports Department is dedicated to removing barriers to academic, career, and social-emotional growth for all students in the Paulding County School District. Our goal is to efficiently and effectively support schools, staff, students, and the community through comprehensive wraparound services, including:

- Providing guidance and advisement throughout students' PCSD school careers.
- Offering resources through school counselors, social workers, and the homeless liaison to support students and the community.
- Using data-driven decision-making to proactively address behavior and school climate.
- Establishing safe learning environments by implementing social-emotional learning (SEL) best practices to develop strong interpersonal and intrapersonal skills.
- Delivering resources and training to support prevention and intervention services that promote students' mental health growth.

Through these efforts, we strive to ensure every student has the support needed to succeed academically, socially, and emotionally.

School Social Workers


As part of the student support system, students may be referred to School Social Workers, who play a vital role in bridging schools, families, and communities to ensure student success. Their primary focus is addressing social, emotional, and behavioral challenges that impact learning.


Key responsibilities of School Social Workers include:

- Providing direct support to students.
- Collaborating with school staff.
- Connecting families to community resources.
- Advocating for students.
- Implementing attendance interventions.

Their efforts ensure students receive comprehensive wraparound support to thrive academically, socially, and emotionally. Referrals are submitted through the **SWARM (Social Worker Activity and Referral Module)** within the Infinite Campus Student Information System.

The charts below highlight the number of SWARM referrals in the first quarter of this year compared to the same period in 2022-2023 and 2023-2024. The second chart provides a breakdown of referral reasons.





Mental Health Supports

The district develops systems to support mental health, identify concerns, and provide proactive prevention strategies to reduce potential acts of violence. Key initiatives include:


- Mental Health Resources: Consultation and professional learning opportunities for school counselors, social workers, and safety advisors.
- **School-Based Therapy**: Partnerships with three local agencies serving 29 schools and approximately 275 students.

Suicide Prevention:

- QPR Suicide Prevention and Awareness Trainings: Conducted at 8 schools in the first quarter, training 888 staff members.
- Sources of Strength: A peer-led program teaching students healthy coping mechanisms for life's stressors.
- **Crisis Response**: Providing support for school communities affected by student and staff deaths or trauma from significant events such as lockdowns. In the first quarter, the district responded to two staff deaths and one student death.

Columbia Suicide Scale Data

• Columbia Suicide Severity Rating Scales - Assessments on students who are expressing suicidal ideations. This is followed up by parent/guardian contact, shared resources, and safety plans. 226 were completed in the first quarter district wide.



Homeless Students

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, part of No Child Left Behind, ensures educational rights and protections for children and youth experiencing homelessness, with the primary goal of fostering educational stability and academic success.

Under McKinney-Vento, homeless students are identified as those lacking a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. The number of students served by the program within the Paulding County School District fluctuates throughout the academic year. Currently, the program is supporting 132 students.

School Supports

The **School Supports Department** is dedicated to providing exceptional operational support to our schools, prioritizing efficiency, effectiveness, and outstanding customer service. Key services include:

- Health and wellness support provided by School Nurses.
- **Student enrollment and information management** through the Central Registration Office and Student Information System.
- Nutritious, affordable meals delivered by School Nutrition services.
- Facility cleaning and maintenance handled by Custodial Services.
- Truancy support and interventions managed by School Attendance Officers.

Our team is committed to ensuring these essential services help create a supportive and effective learning environment for all.

Attendance

The **School Supports Department** includes three Attendance Officers who serve as a vital resource for schools in managing student attendance. Attendance Officers assist school administrators when a student accrues five (5) unexcused absences by collaborating with parents/guardians to ensure daily school attendance.

Key responsibilities include:

- Conducting home visits.
- Meeting with students at school.
- Filing truancy charges with the local court system if necessary.

The chart below shows the **average daily attendance percentage** for the first quarter of this school year, reflecting the commitment to keeping students engaged and present in their educational journey.



Student Registration

All new students or those returning to the Paulding County School District from outside the county are registered through the **Central Registration Office**. Families have the option to complete the registration process online or in person at the Central Registration Office.

By consolidating the registration process into one location, Central Registration ensures a streamlined experience while effectively monitoring student enrollment for state funding purposes.

The chart below shows the **number of new students registered each month**, highlighting enrollment trends.



Custodial Inspection Scores

The Paulding County School District employs a **hybrid custodial model** to ensure schools and buildings are thoroughly cleaned daily. This model includes district-employed custodial staff, such as a District Custodial Supervisor, zone managers, lead custodians, and day porters, alongside contracted services from **HES Facilities Management**, which performs targeted cleaning after school hours.

Each morning, the District Custodial Supervisor and zone managers conduct random inspections to evaluate the cleaning completed by HES Facilities Management. Schools are graded on a **0-100 scale**, with scores below 80 considered failing, requiring a joint reinspection the following morning with HES management.

The chart below shows the **average inspection scores by school level**, reflecting the district's commitment to maintaining clean and safe learning environments.

Clinic Visits

Every school in the district has a **full-time dedicated nurse**, with larger schools receiving additional nursing support based on student enrollment. School Nurses are supported by two Lead Nurses and a Nursing Supervisor.

Students visit the school clinic for various reasons, including:

- Medication administration.
- Minor injuries such as bumps and bruises.
- Management of serious medical conditions, such as diabetes.
- Addressing student illness.

Staff members also have access to the clinics and nursing services as needed.

The chart below displays the **total number of clinic visits per month**, reflecting the vital role school nurses play in supporting student and staff well-being.

Transportation

The **Paulding County School District Transportation Department** is dedicated to providing safe, professional, and reliable transportation for eligible students, supporting both daily instructional programs and extracurricular activities.


As an extension of the classroom, the Transportation Department plays a vital role in students' education. **Safety is our top priority**, and ensuring it is a team effort involving students, parents, teachers, school administrators, and drivers.

To enhance convenience, we utilize the **Here Comes the Bus** app, which allows parents to track their child's school bus in real time.

Each day, the Transportation Department safely transports over **19,000 students**, covering more than **23,000 miles**.


Driver Vacancy and Attendance

A successful Transportation Department relies on employing enough bus drivers to meet ridership demands. This ensures shorter routes, compliance with state bus capacity limits, and minimizes student travel time. Maintaining a low driver vacancy rate also supports consistent operations during staff absences.



On Time Arrivals

There are several factors that can impact school buses getting to school campuses and homes in a timely manner. Driver vacancy, attendance, and unexpected congestion and construction on our county roadways can all impact bus arrival times.



Athletics

Interscholastic activities in the Paulding County School District play a vital role in the overall educational experience, offering students opportunities to develop teamwork, self-respect, respect for others, a desire to succeed, mental and physical discipline, and pride in their school.

The district's five high schools participate in interscholastic activities as members of the **Georgia High School Association (GHSA)**:

- Paulding County High School (PCHS) Region 3-AAAAAA
- East Paulding High School (EPHS) Region 5-AAAAA
- Hiram High School (HHS) Region 7-AAAA
- North Paulding High School (NPHS) Region 5-AAAAAA
- South Paulding High School (SPHS) Region 5-AAAAA

These activities provide students with meaningful experiences that support their personal and academic growth.

Fall Quarterly Sports Summary

The sports/activities below are recognized by the Georgia High School Association as fall sports. We have shared some highlights from the fall sports season for all five of our high schools.

Football

EPHS (10-2) advanced to the second round of state playoffs.

HHS (5-6), and North Paulding (6-5) advanced to the first round of state playoffs.

Flag Football

PCHS (15-0) went undefeated in their regular season and were Area Champs. They will host the first round of state playoffs (Begin Dec 5th).

HHS (10-4) and SPHS (13-11) both qualified for the state playoffs (Begin Dec 5th)

Cheer

NPHS cheer qualified for the state competition and placed fourth.

Softball

EPHS (27-9) was Region Champs and advanced to the Elite 8 in the state playoffs.

SPHS (17-10) and NPHS (26-7) both qualified for state and advanced to the sweet sixteen in the first round of state playoffs.

Cross Country

NPHS had both their girls and boys teams qualify for the state meet.

EPHS boys qualified for the state meet.

HHS had one female qualify for the state meet.

Volleyball

SPHS (16-19) finished fourth in the region and advanced to first round of state playoffs.

EPHS (30-10) finished second in the region and advanced to first round of state playoffs.

Other Sports/Activities:

All five of our high schools have an active Riflery, One Act Play and Literary presence. We did not have any teams qualify for state with their One Act Play performances. Riflery competition will begin after Christmas break and run into February and Literary will have opportunities to compete in March.
